When?

Thursday, February 26, 2004

Where?

Various locations within the District

How much?

An increase of 5¢ per \$100 of assessed value per year for 4 consecutive years, starting in the upcoming tax year, yielding a total tax increase of 20¢ per \$100 of assessed value in the 2007-2008 tax year

Who can vote?

Citizens, 18 years of age or older, who are residents of Red Clay

WHY A REFERENDUM?

Even though we have cut costs over the last several years, increases in fixed costs and other program improvements have outpaced our revenues

If things remain the same, the district will have a deficit by 2006.

WHERE WILL THIS MONEY GO?

Safety enhancements (including bus radio replacement)

Continuation and enhancement of special programs (performing arts, athletics, advanced placement courses)

Continuance of on-going programs (mentoring programs, all-day kindergarten in targeted schools, discipline programs, textbook acquisitions, additional personnel support in schools)

Additional operating expenses (energy costs, salaries, benefits)

Technology (maintenance and Replacement)

WHAT IF IT DOESN'T PASS?

We'll have to make significant cuts in programs and personnel should the referendum not pass. There is no doubt that these cuts will affect

class size
athletic programs
performing arts programs
mentoring programs
discipline programs
just to name a few*

WHY IS THIS REFERENDUM DIFFERENT?

The referendum two years ago was to sell bonds to support renovating all of our schools, including additions at many of them, and building a new elementary school. Money authorized by the bond referendum two years ago can only be used for construction. The last successful current operating expense referendum was in May 1995. It was expected that the money provided by that referendum would last 5 years. Strong management and strict cost-cutting allowed the district to stretch the increase to last 8 years

University of Delaware Summer College for High School Juniors June 26 - July 31, 2004



The University of Delaware offers a five-week program, Summer College, for academically-motivated high school students who have completed their junior year. The program is designed to prepare students for college. They live on campus, earn 6 or 7 transferable college credits, and participate in a variety of programs that help them manage the transition from high school to college. Freshman-level courses, open only to Summer College students, are taught by University instructors and include biology, chemistry, criminal justice, English literature, critical reading and writing, history, philosophy, psychology, statistics, and mass communication. Social, cultural, and recreational activities are planned for the students, including weekend day trips to nearby areas. A Summer College information session will be held at your school in February. The program's coordinator, Elizabeth Reynolds, will present a program overview, a brief slide show, and answer questions. If you wish to attend, contact your guidance counselor, who will know the date by late January.

Pride in Pasadena

As I write this I am on the journey home following the Band's performance in the Rose Parade. For those of you who couldn't be with us, I want to share some observations and experiences.

First, you should be very proud, very proud. Your kids were first class ambassadors for A.I. duPont and the state of Delaware. In my travels with the band, I am always impressed with the number of unsolicited comments from airport, hotel and restaurant employees, other travelers, hotel guests and others as to how polite, well behaved and talented our kids are. This trip was no exception.

As to their performances, they proved on a national level that they are every bit as good as we believe they are. As one of the elite bands performing in Bandfest at Pasadena City College, they shined. A.I. duPont had the challenge of following the Riverside College marching band. Riverside College is bigger than UD with 32,000 students and their band was phenomenal, and used amplifiers too! Everyone in the stands must have had the same thought as our Tigers band followed them onto the field – we pity the high school band that has to follow that act. The Tiger band met the challenge like no other band could. They were at the top of their game and put on a show that drew a spontaneous standing ovation!

On parade day, the kids awoke at 2:45 am and prepared for the long march. The parade was a thrill, with magnificent floats and over 1 million spectators lining the 5.5-mile route. The crowd surrounding the chaperones joined in chanting "A.I., A.I." as the band approached. They, and we were wowed! Of all of the great bands we saw march before us yesterday, our kids were the best of the best. Spectators further down the route told us that A.I. was the only band still marching and performing in the last portion of the parade.

As I've said in the past, a great band and a great group of young people doesn't just happen. It's the product of many factors including a supportive school and district administration – both Dr. Andrzejewski and Mr. Boyer were there; supportive teachers – Mrs. Olmstead, Mr. Hogan; an energetic assistant band director, Mr. Weaver; supportive parents and active band boosters members, especially those who make these trips possible by chaperoning and helping with fund-raising, and most importantly, an outstanding director who cares for our kids as though they were his own – Mr. Parets.

As I said at the outset, you should be proud. Thanks for all that you do to help the band. The Band Boosters organization has had a great year so far, by every measure. If you're not involved, please get involved so that we can continue to provide these once-in-a-lifetime opportunities to our kids.
